Course Description

This course presents an introduction to the major artists of America's history from the Colonial period to the present and relates them to the social, political, and cultural contexts of the past 400+ years.

Please note that this course is offered in modality "M," which means MIXED MODE. We will meet in person once a week and additional materials are posted on this webcourse.

Course Objectives

- 1. Identify and critically engage with art and history of the United States
- 2. Appreciate the challenges inherent in studying art history

3. Demonstrate the ability to use discourse, analysis, and evaluation skills appropriate to art history

Assignments

Discussion Boards (40%)

This course is organized into modules with 1 module covered each week. At the end of each module is a discussion board prompt. Every week you will need to post to the discussion board (substantive post) and then post a response to someone else's comment (responsive post). You need to post **one substantive post** (about 250 words) and **one responsive post** (about 50-75 words) every week. These 2 posts will be due by Saturday at 11:59 pm. Post your first post by Thursday, so that others have time to read your post and reply. You must **post two times** each week to receive full credit, but feel free to post more if you get a good conversation going.

The Discussion Board Posts will support your efforts to:

- 1. Identify and engage with American art
- 2. Appreciate the challenges inherent in studying visual culture
- 3. Analyze and evaluate art
- 4. Learn from others and engage in dialogue

Quizzes (45%)

This course is organized into modules with 1 module covered each week. Every week will conclude with a quiz on that week's material due by Sunday at 11:59pm. These quizzes will be a mixture of multiple choice and true-false questions drawn from material found in the chapter module pages.

The guizzes will to test your ability to:

- 1. Identify, analyze, and evaluate American art
- 2. Comprehend and recall historical facts

Project (15%)

This semester you will curate a digital exhibition on a theme in American art that features the work of two American artists. Your exhibition should feature 10 images, five by each artist. Each image should be labeled with the artist, title, and date, as well as

additional interpretative information (approximately 50 words). Your exhibition should also include a curatorial statement of 300 words that explains why you have put the work of these artists together. You should create your exhibition using a platform such as PowerPoint.

Please let me know if you need to make arrangements due to emergency, illness, religious holiday, or military service. All the modules and assignments are open. You are welcome to work ahead and submit work at any time.
