Course Description

Inquiry into the meaning and justification of fundamental ideas and beliefs concerning reality, knowledge, and values; application to relevant topics in ethics, religion, and politics.

Course Purpose

In this section the course, I will introduce you to a variety of philosophical concepts and themes (see above). But we will focus on the nature of the good life. A classical philosophical concern was how to live well. We will explore several theories of the good life as well as other philosophical issues in light of their interplay with today's popular culture and everyday life. You will have the opportunity to reflect on what "the good life" means to you. By the end of this course, I hope that you will have a clearer sense of how your educational journey here connects to the life you hope to live.

- Everything else you need is contained in Course modules. You do not need to purchase any texts for this class. There are, however, a number of required readings (both classical and contemporary philosophical texts and relevant videos) provided in each online unit.

Student Learning Outcomes

- Describe several classical and contemporary philosophical conceptions of the good life (quizzes and exams)
- Think critically about diverse beliefs, values, and practices in relation to diverse philosophical and cultural values (module discussions, self-reflection surveys)
- Engage in philosophical discussions about self, community, and culture (module discussions)
- Reflect on your own academic and other life choices (self-reflection surveys)

Course Activities

Attendance/Participation

In a W course, you have the flexibility to check into the course at times convenient to you. To succeed, you should have regular access to the internet and plan on logging into the course at least twice each week. Please consult the course calendar for assignment deadlines in organizing your activities for this course. Plan on an average of 4-6 hours work (readings/viewings plus graded assignments).

Opportunities for Community

In addition to grades, college provides opportunities for building community. This asynchronous course provides opportunities for community by dividing a large class into small group experiences. In your small groups (15-16 students), you can get to know one another over the course of the semester, as you engage in

ongoing discussion of course themes and required material. I encourage you take advantage of this opportunity for intellectual community.

Graded Activities

Philosophy happens through dialogue and critical self-reflection informed by diverse thinkers. Thus, your grade in the class will reflect the following components:

Quizzes: 30%

Quizzes are designed to ensure you understand the reading and viewing material assigned. There will be 7 quizzes during the semester worth 5% each. Your final grade for this portion of the class will reflect your 6 highest quiz scores. Each quiz will consist of 8-12 objective questions (MC, T/F, fill in the blank, etc.). Quizzes will be timed. They are open book, but you should read and view the material carefully prior to taking the quiz as there will not be time to read everything as you are taking a quiz. See deadlines on calendar.

Discussions: 35%

Philosophy requires dialogue about what you are learning. Thus 35% of your course grade will reflect the quantity and quality of your efforts to engage with your peers in philosophical discussions about the good life. Deadlines are on the course schedule. Each discussion forum will be worth 5% and you will be evaluated on the quantity and quality of your participation, as well as your professionalism (i.e., your ability to meet deadlines, proofread your work, etc.). There are 8 discussion forums during the semester; your grade here will be comprised of your 7 highest scores.

Surveys: 15%

You will take 8 surveys during the semester. Questions are designed to have you engage in self-reflection regarding your own conceptions of the good life and how these beliefs are (or are not) embodied in your choices and actions. You will not be evaluated on the content of your answers but simply on your efforts to take the time to reflect during each unit. Surveys are untimed to give you as much time as you like to think about the questions. However, you must complete the survey by the deadline. Deadlines are on the calendar. Each survey is worth 2% and you will receive full marks for each one you complete. [The attentive among you will note that this gives you a possible 16%. Consider this an extra-credit opportunity.]

Final exam: 20%

This exam will consist of both objective and open-ended (e.g., short answer and/or essay) questions. It will be a comprehensive exam designed to assess your ability to understand, compare and contrast, and synthesize course material. See course schedule for date. As with quizzes, your final exam will be timed and open book.

Activity Submissions

All assignments will be submitted online. Assignment links and specific instructions are available in each course Module.

Make-up Exams and Assignments

Per university policy, you are allowed to submit make-up work (or an equivalent, alternate assignment) for authorized university-sponsored activities, religious observances, or legal obligations (such as jury duty). If this participation conflicts with your course assignments, I will offer a reasonable opportunity for you to complete missed assignments and/or exams. The make-up assignment and grading scale will be equivalent to the missed assignment and its grading scale. In the case of an authorized university activity, it is your responsibility to show me a signed copy of the Program Verification Form for which you will be absent, prior to the class in which the absence occurs. In any of these cases, please contact me ahead of time to notify me of upcoming needs.

As this is an online class with 2 week long modules and assignments open for windows of no less than 5 days, it is my expectation that you will have opportunities, before, during or after religious observances and university sponsored travel to complete your assigned work. Because considerable flexibility is already built into this class, please do not contact me for make-up work unless you can document that it was, in fact, impossible for you to do the required assignment during the entire time it was available to you. Please consult "accommodations" policies and remember that you should notify me as soon as possible, should you need accommodations. Requests for make-up work at the end of the semester are unlikely to be honored.

Late Work

Late submissions will not be given full credit unless you have an excuse recognized by UCF policy (e.g., hospitalization of a family member, documented medical excuse) OR you are dealing with some other circumstance truly beyond your control (e.g., longstanding power outages due to Hurricane or other natural disaster). Many legitimate reasons for absence (e.g., religious holidays, UCF related travel) are not excuses for late submissions; work should be turned in early when you know you will be unable to submit it on the deadline. Please avoid procrastination in order to meet deadlines. Outside of natural disasters such as hurricanes, lack of internet access and/or lack of computer equipment is NOT a reason for late submissions. This is a fully online class, and the assumption is that you have regular access to the internet and the hardware for reading, viewing and communicating digitally. In cases of internet or equipment failures during the semester, there are computers accessible to you in all UCF's computer labs and the UCF library. Most public libraries also provide free access to the internet.

Extra-credit

I do not offer extra-credit assignments at the end of the semester. Extra-credit is built into the class in the form of extra point opportunities and dropping of lowest module discussion and quiz scores.
